a look at the honey show 2015

Firstly a big 'Thank You' to all who helped in any way to make the 2015 Honey Show another successful occasion. Many members participated and helped the day to run smoothly. From the people who turned up early to set the room out, those who helped with the admin and judging, to the group who made and organised the afternoon tea, the speaker Chris Park and honey judge Terry Ashley and of course the people who submitted their products, you all played a very important part. The Honey Show was again an excellent team effort.

For those of you who were unable to attend, the 2015 NSBKA Honey Show comprised of: Honey and Honey products judged by Terry Ashley (from South Cheshire), a talk by Chris Park, (skep maker and skep beekeeper from Wiltshire and chair of the newly formed British Beekeeping Heritage Society) on 'Mead, Mythology and Medicine' and afternoon tea followed by feedback from the Show Judge. Around 50 people attended during the day.

There was time to help members who needed it prior to benching their products and for members old and new to meet socially over tea. Many senior members were available to mentor those less experienced in showing, which added to the development of beekeeping skills. The excellent afternoon tea was provided by a group of volunteers this year, which helped to spread the work.

2015 Honey Show entries

This year's Honey Show attracted 65 entries from 18 competitors (compared with 34 entries from 15 competitors in 2015). The Black jar class continued to be well supported with 13 entries (11 in 2014) and Class 1 had 8 entries (5 in 2015). There were entries in a greater number of classes this year, only 4 classes did not have any entries compared with 8 last year. The Judge was complementary about the standard of the entries but pointed out that a greater attention to detail would have helped some entries.

The number of entries was the highest for more than 10 years and more members will be receiving cash prizes and cups. A total of £165 will be awarded in cash prizes.

The awards will be presented at our AGM in January so please be sure you are there to collect your winnings.

Trentham Gardens Estate Apiary opportunity

I was contacted a month or so ago by Trentham Gardens who would like to have beehives within their estate. They are looking for an experienced beekeeper willing to place and maintain hives.

They are quite open to where the hives would be situated and would provide the necessary protection, fencing etc, to ensure the public are kept at a safe distance.

The beekeeper would have free access to the estate via the trade entrance and would be issued with a pass. There would be some obligation by the beekeeper to talk to the public, on occasions, about beekeeping. Exactly what that entails would need to be discussed.

As I understand it the estate recently established a considerable area of wild flower meadow and of course there are the nationally important gardens within bee flying distance.

Also I understand that there is the opportunity to sell any honey produced in a shop on the estate.

If you are interested then please get in touch with me and I will let you have the details of who to contact. They would then invite you to go along and have a chat about the possibilities.

One in ten wild bees face extinction in Europe

A report by the BBC Environment Correspondent Helen Briggs claims that one in ten of our wild bees in Europe are in danger of extinction. There are one thousand nine hundred and sixty five bee species native to Europe and 9.2% of these are on a red list drawn up by the International Union for Conservation of Nature according to the report. The threats are put down to various issues including a loss of habitat, intensive farming, pesticide use, urban development and climate change

A spokesperson for the IUCN suggests that the assessment is the best understanding so far on wild bees but goes on to say that the knowledge is incomplete and puts this down to an "Alarming lack of expertise and resources".

The study highlights the economic value that all bees including hived bees have in terms of pollination alone and it is suggested that urgent investment in research is required to bring forward **the best possible recommendations on how to reverse their decline**.

Spoonfuls of honey help homeless

A MASSIVE bee colony is helping the homeless in a new honey-making venture, writes Kuba Shand-Baptiste.

Beehives installed on the roof of St Martin's Court-yard in Covent Garden five years ago are yielding huge supplies that are now being sold in stores. All proceeds are going to homeless charity, The Connection.

Art consultant-turned-beekeeper Camilla Goddard (pictured on page 1), who also runs hives at

the Garrick and Old Bailey, said her work was "a beautiful process and a way of being close to nature in London".

Beekeepers have been confronted with a recent government decision to lift a previous ban on certain pesticides that have produced dire results for bees in the past.

Ms Goddard said: "I've personally experienced insecticide poisoning in London about four or five times.

"You get a really fast pile of bees dead or dying outside the hive [because] the bees won't let them in... It is certainly not good for colonies."

She added: "Look for year-round flowering... don't cut your ivy... and plant in blocks so it becomes a really good nectar source."

The honey, produced by the Department of Coffee and Social Affairs at St Martin's Courtyard, starts at £1.

Rediscovering the First recorded Drone Congregation Area

Back in August of 2015 a blog was posted on the Vita Europe website by their blogger Turlough about an attempt to rediscover a Drone Congregation Area on Selborne Common in Hampshire.

First found and documented by Gilbert White who was an 18th century Naturalist. The event amused him greatly he suggests although he didn't understand what it was:

Humming in the air

There is a natural occurrence to be met with upon the highest part of our down in hot summer days, which always amuses me much, without giving me any satisfaction with respect to the cause of it; and that is a loud audible humming of bees in the air, though not one insect is to be seen. This sound is to be heard distinctly the whole common through, from the Moneydells, to Mr White's avenue-gate. Any person would suppose that a large swarm of bees was in motion, & playing about over his head. This noise was heard last week on June 28th"

Leaping forward to the 20th century Beowulf Cooper wrote that he had found it again in 1973 but didn't give its precise location.

This then brings us up to the present day with the search being made by the Vita's Blogger.

Giving us details of the surrounding landscape noting that "Selborne Common is on a 200 metre high Greensand plateau on the edge of chalk country". She/he goes on to describe the common as "heavily wooded with many Beech trees and some small clearings". This it's recorded would more than likely have been different in White's day with less wooded areas, mainly due to grazing.

It was in one of these clearings "just before Sheep Down" where the blogger witnesses once again this natural phenomenon using a long fishing rod with a queen lure attached Turlough writes of "being hit on the head a few times by wayward drones an indignity I don't think White suffered" she/he says.

The number of Drones albeit not on a large scale (this may have been down to the time of year...August) was discovered active and enabled a sound recording to be made which is also posted on the blog page.

Turlough finally writes that a return date in June has been set!
