

#### Varroa Resistance through Bee Improvement

Steve Riley is the author of The Honey Bee Solution to Varroa. His book explains the practical steps beekeepers can take to identify and select for easily observable varroa-resistant traits in their colonies and follows Steve's own journey as a beekeeper to becoming treatment free.

He is the current Chair and Education Officer at Westerham BKA in the south west of England and also a member of the 'Path to Varroa Resistance in the UK' team that launched the education and science website: www.varroaresistantuk in April 2023

The presentation covers how to select and monitor for varroa resistant traits, whilst transitioning off miticide treatment/IPM. This includes the pitfalls of getting started and dealing with mite susceptible colonies (varroa breeders). The benefits of working collaboratively is highlighted to spread the best traits amongst fellow beekeepers

Varroa check

For those who are considering treating for Varroa: Once you've completed harvesting your honey, then this is a good time to carry out the treatment. To do this now as we head to Autumn can help protect the bees that are destined to carry the colony into and through winter.

You can treat while you are feeding syrup for winter.

Try to avoid simply blanket treatment. This doesn't help the bees develop natural strategies in combating the infestation.

Monitor the natural mite drop on the varroa board over a seven

day period. Divide this figure by seven to get your daily drop.

The National Bee Unit document whose link is given below suggests that 'Broadly speaking, average daily mite drop should not be more than thirty as this indicates a serious mite infestation and treatment is urgently needed, while below ten is considered acceptable and you do not need to treat just now. Between ten and thirty, you are in a zone where you should be treating imminently.'
