

Class

- 1. Two jars of Light, Medium or Dark Honey**
This class is for entries from members who have not previously won a prize in a honey show
- 2. Two jars of Light Honey**
- 3. Two jars of Medium Honey**
- 4. Two jars of Dark Honey**
- 5. Black jar class**
One jar of liquid honey, judged solely on taste, aroma and viscosity, to be shown in an opaque jar (The jar may be painted on the outside with black paint or covered with masking tape)
- 6. Two jars of Heather Honey (Ling)**
- 7. Two jars of Chunk Honey.** To consist of approximately 50% comb.
- 8. Two jars of naturally Crystallised Honey**
- 9. Two jars of Soft Set Honey**
- 10. Three jars of different types of Honey**
Any combination of honey e.g. light, medium, dark, soft set or crystallised honey.
- 11. 2 identical Beeswax candles**
- 12. 2 identical Beeswax models**
- 13. One frame of Honey suitable for extracting**
- 14. One section of Honey Comb**
- 15. One standard Bottle Mead - (Dry)**
- 16. One standard Bottle Mead - (Sweet)**
Mead should be exhibited in clear colourless (or slightly green tinted) glass bottles stoppered by a cork with a white plastic (or cream coloured) flange
- 17. One Photograph of a Beekeeping subject A4 mounted for display.**
The photograph must have been taken, but not necessarily processed by the entrant.
- 18. Honey Cake**
4oz (100g) butter or margarine
6oz (150g) honey
8oz (200g) self-raising flour
6oz (150g) sultanas
2 eggs
Cream together the fat and honey, beat the eggs well and add with the sifted flour. Beat well and lightly. A little milk may be added as necessary. Turn in sultanas and mix well. Bake in a 6½-7½inch round tin for about 1¼ hours in a moderate oven.
- 19. Honey Flapjacks**
125g (6oz) Margarine or butter 75g (3oz) honey
200g (8oz) porridge oats 75g (3oz) light brown sugar
Melt fat sugar and honey. Mix in oats and stir well. Press into 20cm (8in) pan and smooth surface with a spoon. Bake at 180 C / 350F for 25-30 min until set and golden brown. Mark into squares or slices while still warm. Serve all flapjacks on a plain plate, covered with cling film.

20. Equipment

Any piece of beekeeping equipment made or adapted by the entrant- an explanation of its use should be displayed with the item.

21. Bee Forage Flower arrangement.

Can be fresh or dried. Minimum 6 different flowers foraged by the honey bee but with a total of twelve flowers altogether. List of flowers used to be displayed on A4 sheet with the arrangement.

22. Children under 14 years old Bee Crafts.

Open to Children or Grandchildren of members. Any craft such as painting, model, knitting, etc. depicting bees/bee hives in some way. Age of entrant to be shown on the display.
